## Meet HLAS Member

This month, we profile our Treasurer, LaVonne Stocco. LaVonne was diagnosed as having a hearing loss at age five when she was enrolled in the neighborhood kindergarten class. She attended special education classes through the eighth grade that included speech therapy and lip reading lessons.

.LaVonne started wearing a hearing aid that was five inches long and worn on the body with a cord dangling from the ear. Over the years she acquired smaller hearing aids which enabled her to cope with getting through college, raising four children, finding jobs, enjoying music and traveling.

LaVonne lived in Chicago, IL most of her life, but also lived in Kitchener, Ontario. After her children were all in school, LaVonne was employed at the Rotary International Headquarters in Evanston, IL in the Finance Department.

Self Help for Hard of Hearing People (later changed to Hearing Loss Association of Sarasota) was discovered in 1997 when LaVonne and her husband, Frank, moved to Sarasota from Chicago after their retirement. Volunteering soon became a way of life, as she took on roles at different times as HLAS Newsletter/Bulletin Editor, Board Trustee, Secretary, Treasurer, and President. LaVonne says, "helping people cope with hearing loss and seeing what can be accomplished through providing education and volunteering has given me much satisfaction. The friends that I have made within the chapter have added to that satisfaction."

LaVonne enjoys among other things, spending time with her husband and family; playing cards; reading novels and non-fiction books; going to the theater and movies; gourmet cooking; and traveling.
