





WOW! Expo Entices 650 to Attend!

The 3rd annual Hearing Tech Expo drew 30% more visitors than last year with 274 attending at least one seminar, an increase of over 400% from the 2013 Expo. The 650 visitors, plus all the exhibitors, speakers and volunteers on hand made for some 800 people at the event at Manatee Technical Institute on March 8. Perhaps most gratifying was that some 250 visitors got their first exposure to HLAA and how the organization can help them to improve their listening and communication skills.

The exhibit hall featured 47 organizations covering the gamut of the leading hearing aid and cochlear implant manufacturers, assistive listening device suppliers, hearing care professionals plus a wide range of support groups. Many visitors talked about discovering a new technology or audiologist that they felt could make a difference for them while others were excited to find a specific support group that could help them address a nagging problem such as a balance disorder, tinnitus or a financial need.

One in ten attendees walked away with amplified or captioned phone at no cost. Many others signed-up for a smoke alarm specially designed for those with hearing loss that the Manatee Fire Department will install in homes for free as a public service. The 14 seminars covered all the same areas with a focus on educating everyone on how to open their world of communication and lead a more active life.

"So many people came up to us to tell how much they learned, how much they were encouraged and how the complexity of dealing with hearing loss was demystified" said HLAA-Sarasota president Ed Ogiba. "Thanks to our very supportive exhibitors and our expert speakers, we know that we helped a lot of people this day".



MARCH MEETING RECAP

New Universal FM System



Dr. Jana Rentz, AuD, of Phonak, presented an exciting new wireless technology called "Roger" to our members on March 12. Roger is the name of the next generation FM system marketed by Phonak and must be purchased through your audiologist, as fitting and programming is involved. Even if your

hearing aids are not Phonak, it is possible to connect Roger with a MyLink device. Roger is also available in a Bluetooth version, which enables you to wirelessly synchronize your TV, phones and any other devices that are Bluetooth enabled.

Using Roger significantly increases the functionality of your hearing aids by:

- Reducing the signal to noise ratio in other words, the Roger Pen compensates for distance and loud noise and directs what you want to hear to your hearing aid and greatly reduces extraneous noise in the background
- Allows you to connect wirelessly and seamlessly with other devices

MARCH AFTER HOURS MEETING RECAP

"Why We Need More Than Hearing Aids"

The March 25 meeting of the After Hours group featured Dr. Lyndsey Nalu of Adept Audiol-

ogy discussing the many tools that can help us to improve our hearing and listening skills. She stressed that getting hearing aids is only the foundation and that is important to return to your audiologist for new programs or programming adjustments to help with problems like noisy situations or reception of music. She also detailed the invaluable role of auditory training, loops, movie captions and communication strategies to significantly improve hearing and understanding of voices. Lyndsey's After Hours partner, Bob Leonard, then shared his script for a new three minute video which he is plannig to produce to highlight the benefits of assitive listening devices. Bob is a graduate of the HLAA HAT (Hearing Assitive Technology) Program. All attendees of this program are required to do a community presentation. Bob, who runs Ascellerent Studios, a marketing company which specializes in videos, decided to use his skills to create a presentation that could be used again by our chapter and others. To bring the script to life, he nabbed five chapter leaders to play the roles of the various characters in his video script which tracks one person with hearing loss as they learn about various ALDs that can help address situations in which hearing aids are not enough.




Our Movie Club Is Your Ticket to First Run Movies in Captions






HLAA National Convention in Austin Texas in 2014

MEDICAL UPDATE

Better Hearing Takes Practice

Studies validate Dr. Frank Lin's findings that, with practice, a hard of hearing person can hear above the din in place like restaurants and receptions. Dr. Lin of Johns Hopkins first presented his findings to the HLAA Convention in 2012.

In a study reported in *Science Magazine*, Dr. Nina Kraus of Northwestern University concluded, "After training, participants' neural timing did not become equivalent to that of a young adult but they were, however, able to successfully hear, remember, and understand sentences in noisy background listening ... and showed a 50% increase in neural timing".

LEGAL UPDATE

Brighter Outlook for TV and Online Captioning

Almost 10 years after consumer groups including HLAA filed a petition with the FCC requesting standards for caption quality, the FCC has acted. On February 20, at their Open Meeting the FCC voted unanimously to

upgrade TV closed captioning quality.

FCC Chairman Tom Wheeler, in sign language, signed "This is just the beginning".

He commented that "'Five wins and a very light power reese know' sounds more like gibberish than a weather forecast". He said that was the closed caption that hearing-impaired people got during a report from the WeatherNation channel last month. What the caption was supposed to say was, 'high winds and a very light, powdery snow.'"

Captions have often been garbled or unreadable and the FCC has had no enforcement power to correct this. New rules will put an end to this sloppiness.

The FCC will require that captions match spoken words in dialogue and convey background noises and other sounds to the fullest extent possible, according to agency officials familiar with the order. The order will also mandate that captions not block other content on the screen, overlap one another, run off the edge of the video screen or be blocked by other information. That also would apply to online video of shows that originated on TV, though not yet on video clips, which don't have to be captioned. Wheeler noted at the meeting that he appeared to have two votes for extending the captioning requirement to clips, which the FCC last year decided, at least for the time being, not to do.
